## Venue Hire and Music

It is cheaper having your wedding reception between Monday and Thursdays during the week at most reception houses.

We saved almost \$30 per head by having our reception on a Thursday night, as opposed to Friday, Saturday or Sunday.

With over 80 guests, we saved around \$2 400, and you can save even more by marrying during off-peak season.
